SCWK-3813. Native Cultural Identity and Cultural Survival (NATI)

Course description: This course explores the historical and contemporary issues of Native Cultural Identity and Cultural Survival. SCWK-5006. Preparation for Professional Social Work Practice (F)

Course description: This course prepares students for professional social work practice. This course is designed to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of the fundamentals of community organizing. SCWK-5513. Social Work, Organizations and Native People (K)
